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






A photo album compiled by an African-American woman, Maudesta Patton (née Lowery), in the early 1940s. Patton lived in Los Angeles and was part of the Ex-Debutantes Social Club which is documented throughout the album with photographs, telegrams, programs, and greeting cards. The album opens with Patton and her fellow "Ex-Debutantes" posed in long, fancy dresses in the front yard of Patton's home. Additionally included are programs for events Patton attended including the first Ex-Debutantes Dance in 1941. Other images show Patton and friends having picnics, posed in cars, and showing off fashionable



clothing. It appears Patton had many suitors, some notes from them are included throughout, but she eventually married Patrick N. Patton, captioned here as "my husband Pat."

A modest but interesting collection of photographs and ephemera detailing the social life of a young African-American woman in 1940s Los Angeles. [BTC#437137]















An advertising brochure for Madame C.J. Walker Hair Products, about half of it devoted to advertising her products and extolling her virtues ("The first and only woman in the world to give \$1,000 to a Colored Y.M.C.A.") and lifestyle, including some text in the first person from Walker, with the rest of the pamphlet devoted to testimonials, including one from Mrs. Booker T. Washington. Though born into poverty, Walker founded a cosmetics and manufacturing empire, and is generally considered the first African-American millionaire. Walker died in 1919 and her daughter A'lelia succeeded her, until her own death in 1931. An interesting and attractive brochure of an important African-American business enterprise. Walker began in the "hair growing business" around 1906, and began to hit her stride between 1910 and 1912. Walker's

empire continued to thrive, and most printed material that one encounters related to her company was published after her death. This is an earlier than usual promotional brochure. [BTC#437671]

Both volumes are very good or better with bumping at the corners, fraying at the top of the spine and gift inscriptions. *Elephantland* has a red stain on the rear board and *Jungleland's* front hinge is starting. *Elephantland* is *Inscribed* by Mary Hasting Bradley to Virginia Brooks, the wife of big game hunter Berry Brooks: "Dearest Virginia - I know you'll love Alice's illustrations!

As always - Mary." Mary Hastings Bradley was a successful novelist, hunter, travel writer, and the mother of the illustrator of these books, science-fiction writer Alice Bradley Sheldon, who later wrote under the pseudonym James Tiptree, Jr. Laid in is a two-page Typed Letter Signed by Mary Hasting Bradley dated October 9, 1955 to Berry, along with two Typed Postcards Signed once and with a continuous message. In the letter Bradley describes the many visitors to her cabin in Florence, Wisconsin, including her daughter Alice; thoughts about her latest book, I Passed for White ("a story of race relations -- I don't know that either black or white will like it"); and comments on the two accompanying books: "I am thrilled that you would like the Alice books and have written to New York to get you copies." In the postcards, dated October 29, 1962, Bradley recounts her recent travel, a visit to see Alice, a reference to her son at the C.I.A., and her warning not to see the film version of I Passed for White ("Hollywood at its dumbest!"). Mary Hasting Bradley died in 1977, and it was her obituary that led to the discovery that writer James Tiptree, Jr. was the pseudonym of her daughter Alice Bradley Sheldon, which proved a shocking discovery to the male dominated science fiction world. A nice archive of books and correspondence from a noted travel writer, novelist, and the mother of a Hugo and Nebula Award-winning writer who provided the illustrations for each book. The Native Daughters of the Golden West, a women's group of native-born Californians was founded in 1886 in Jackson in Amador County, and subsequent chapters (or Parlors) were certified over time, and exist to this day, although many Parlors, including the San Leandro Parlor are now defunct. Every indication is that this elaborate and detailed banner was created around 1915, about the time this particular Parlor was founded, and was likely displayed at meetings of the Society. 
A large archive collection consisting of manuscripts, letters, and documents belonging to the American novelist and screenwriter Vera Caspary, together with additional materials from Caspary's husband, the film producer Isidor "Igee" Goldsmith; and George Sklar, a leading figure in the theater of social protest during the 1930s, who collaborated with Caspary on several plays, and was a lifelong close personal friend. Vera Caspary is best known for her classic crime novel *Laura*, which was made into an acclaimed 1944 film directed by Otto Preminger. Caspary wrote several other popular crime novels, including *Bedelia* and *Evvie*, and she received awards from the Screen Writers Guild in 1948 for *A Letter to Three Wives* and in 1967 for *Les Girls*.

Born in 1899 in Chicago, Caspary began her lifelong career as a freelance author and screenwriter in 1927. An unconventional, independent woman, she supported herself at a time when few women had careers of their own. The female characters in her novels and plays are strong, emancipated women, and her analyses of what drives her villains and victims alike are objective and evenhanded. In her screenplays, Caspary displayed an apt ear for dialogue and allowed the characters to reveal themselves through their own words and actions. Beginning with her first novel, *The White Girl* (1929),


about an African-American woman who moves north to Chicago, where she passes as white, Caspary concerned herself with issues of prejudice and class consciousness in twentieth-century America. In her autobiography, *The Secrets of Grown-Ups* (1979), she wrote: "This has been the century of The Woman and I know myself fortunate to have been part of the revolution ... Those who come after us may find it easier to assert independence, but will miss the grand adventure of having been born a woman in this century of change." (Ann Kneavel, *Jewish Women's Archive*).

The collection contains 16 manuscripts by Caspary: consisting of six collaborative works by Caspary and Sklar, including two playscript versions of *Laura* and the original screenplay version of *Gardenia*, which was later published as a short story by Caspary and made into a film noir *The Blue Gardenia* directed by Fritz Lang (1953). Among the works authored solely by Caspary are six screenplays and stories, including *Night of June 13th*, made into a mystery film *The Night of June 13* directed by Stephen Roberts (1932), and two unpublished novels: *Untitled Novel* (200 leaves) which was intended as the sequel to *Evvie*; and one untitled manuscript (209 leaves).










Also included is correspondence by and to Caspary, including several letters from Isidor Goldsmith and George Sklar, and other writers and friends, including the poet Richard Aldington and journalist George Seldes. Caspary's letters refer at length to past and current literary works in progress and other contemporary literary ideas and works, and related cultural and political issues. Also of interest are references to friends and colleagues who were blacklisted by the motion picture industry. George Sklar was among those blacklisted and Very Caspary was graylisted. Caspary also corresponded with Sklar's wife Miriam, who was a modern dance teacher, and their daughter Judy Sklar (Vera was the godmother of the Sklar's three children). The collection includes illustrated letters and decorated manuscripts of children's books handmade by Caspary for Judy when she was a child.







Other highlights from the collection include: nine personal journals kept by Caspary from 1945-67; seventeen published books inscribed by Caspary to various close friends; and several photographs, including portraits inscribed by and to her. Among Caspary's financial and estate records is about one bankers box of letters and documents (rights and royalty agreements, etc.) relating to *Laura* (both the novel and stage play).

The collection also contains photographs and personal papers belonging to Caspary's longtime writing collaborator and husband, Isidor Goldsmith. Born in Vienna, Goldsmith went to Britain in the 1930s, where he took over Grafton Films, and produced several British films, including *The Stars*

Look Down and Hatter's Castle. He collaborated with Vera Caspary during the 1940s, and adapted her novel Bedelia to the screen in 1946 (starring Margaret Lockwood). Included in the archive are personal documents from Austria and Britain, letters and contracts relating to his career as a film producer in the United States, and confidential letters written to Very Caspary at moments of personal crisis.

An historically important collection documenting the life and works of this prominent Jewish-American novelist and screenwriter unfairly graylisted by the industry. A detailed finding aid of the archive is available. [BTC#429413]



An archive of original book illustrations by Ursula Koering, an accomplished New Jersey artist and illustrator of more than 200 children's books. The collection includes dust jacket cover art and in-text illustrations for 10 of her best known children's books and one picture book for young adults. The archive includes Koering's color pastel and color wash cover art drawings, including several variant versions of the same illustrations redrawn in pen and ink, and her in-text pen and ink line drawings. Most of the drawings are on publisher's thick wove-paper sheets or directly on artist board, and several have accompanying pen and ink color separations drawn on acetate overlays. Most are very good or near fine, with scattered

production measurements and notes in the margins. Each set of drawings includes a copy of the printed book for comparison.

Born in Vineland, New Jersey, Koering grew up on a small farm and began drawing at an early age, enrolling in weekend classes at the Philadelphia College of Art starting at the age of eight and later attended full-time to study sculpture, then switched back to drawing upon beginning her career as an illustrator and art teacher at an all-girls school in New Jersey. Her favorite subjects were people in costume, and animals, both of which figure prominently in the 10 collections here.









Nine Autograph Letters <u>Signed</u> totaling 52 pages to her friend Lenette E. Wilson of Algona, Iowa. The letters addressed to "Nettie" cover a fouryear span between 1879-1882. Old folds from mailing, else fine and easily readable. Six of the letters were written from Van Vechten's family home in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, the other three were written from Mt. Carroll Seminary (later Shimer College) then an all-girls school in Mt. Carroll, Illinois, where Mary was studying and graduated in 1882 with a degree in music. The letters from home deal with her family, her music instruction, her impatience with religious "Divines," speculation on whether a local girl is pregnant, and social activities in Cedar Rapids. The letters from Shimer College describe her activities there in some detail and include accounts of her conversations with Mrs. Shimer about Nettie attending the college. One bone of contention arises when Mary suggests that on a recent visit to Cedar Rapids, Nettie paid entirely too much attention to Mary's father: "I know, of course, that you are innocent of anything improper in it, and he too, but your manner toward my father was sometimes the cause of remarks from members of the family, especially my mother, and I myself did not think you always did quite wisely." And "I love my father as I do no one else in the wide world, but I know he has one great weakness...."

The author of these letters, Mary Van Vechten, was the cousin by adoption of author and photographer Carl Van Vechten (who was born in Cedar

Rapids in 1880). She was the Irish-born adopted daughter of Cedar Rapids banker Giles F. Van Vechten, and eventually married Judge Merritt W. Pinckney of Chicago; after Pinckney's death she married a Carmel, California educator Frederic Mason Blanchard.

Amongst the extensive collection of photographs by Carl Van Vechten at the Beinecke Library are at least two images of Mary. The Carl Van Vechten archive at the New York Public Library notes letters to Carl from Mary in their finding aid. A letter from Carl to Noel Sullivan (a close friend and a patron of the arts, who had homes in San Francisco and Carmel) upon Mary's death in 1946 notes that in her will: "I was especially delighted to learn she remembered your musical society and the Negro organizations. The Piney Woods School, to which she was so generous, was practically founded by my father." He also notes about Mary's funereal "...which must have been very beautiful and I shall never forget what a wonderful gesture you made in producing Roland Hayes for the occasion. If he is still with you, please thank him for me."

Nettie Wilson was the daughter of John J. Wilson, an Algona merchant and politician, who later married Edgar B. Butler, a teacher in Algona.

It begins with a group image of the girls in white dresses followed by a pictorial postcard of the "Woods Wheaton Seminary" and the inside of a dorm room with a Harvard pennant. The women are seen posed around the campus, with sports equipment, in their dorms, and in costumes

dressed as colonial men, Native Americans, and various animals, usually with signs for identification. One photo shows a visiting Dartmouth field hockey team posed with their sticks and a sign for the college. The students participated in May Day and paraded about the campus in white dresses with parasols lead by the May Queen. The final page shows a group of women in 1962 and 1967 at the 50th and 55th reunions of the class of 1912. Wheaton Seminary was founded as a female seminary in 1834 and later converted to a four-year women's college in 1912. They didn't allow men until 1988 and existed for over 150 years as a female-only institution. [BTC#412097]
















In *No Legs, No Jokes, No Chance: A History of the American Musical Theater*, the authors credit Richmond's company with the "beginning of American burlesque," (original emphasis) still based on a British parody format, but with "heightened sexiness," and less fidelity to a continuous narrative across multiple acts. (Patinkin & Patinkin, 2008, p. 56).

Later, Richmond was involved in a lurid theater scandal when she contested the will of Boston banker and theater owner John Stetson as his long-lost wife. Although Stetson may have been a bigamist, Richmond lost the suit when her own string of earlier marriages (and lack of divorces) were revealed.

An astonishingly sophisticated letter by the 7-year old Helen Keller to her cousin Anna Keller Turner and her husband George, describing a train trip to Huntsville, Alabama, that she took with her teacher, Annie Sullivan. Keller began studying with Sullivan in March of 1887. This letter, written only months later, demonstrates Keller's remarkable progress in learning to communicate, and it is one of the earliest known Keller letters. Michael Anagnos, the director of the Perkins Institute for the Blind, describes Keller's gains after beginning her studies with Annie Sullivan: "In the course of four months Helen mastered more than four hundred and fifty common words -- nouns, verbs transitive and intransitive, adjectives and prepositions which she could use correctly and spell with perfect accuracy.

At the same time she learned to read raised characters with the tips of her fingers almost spontaneously and with very little effort on the part of her instructress, to converse freely by means of the manual alphabet, to cipher, to write a neat 'square hand,' and to express her elementary ideas in correct composition" (Anagnos, "Helen Keller. A Second Laura Bridgman," in Fifty-Sixth Annual Report of The Perkins Institution And Massachusetts School For The Blind, 1888).

Anagnos describes a letter written by Keller to her mother on 12 July 1887 during a trip to Hunstville and then briefly mentions the present letter: "On her return to Tuscumbia from her visit to Huntsville, Helen wrote a long letter to her cousin George, giving him a minute account of everything that occurred on her way home. She speaks of her meeting in the steam-cars a kind lady, who gave her a drink of water but who 'did talk wrong on fingers.'"

The letter reads in its entirety:

"helen will write letter to cousin george[.] helen and teacher did go to huntsville[.] steam car does go fast george[.] did give helen soda water[.] anna did buy helen pretty new hat[.] helen did play with pinky horse does like sugar[.] mr. rea did kiss helen[.] carlotta will come to see helen in tuscumbia[.] corinne and may and louise did come to see helen[.] robert did shoot little bird wrong[.] helen and teacher did come home. lady did talk wrong on fingers. conductor did take ticket and punch. teacher did buy orange and helen did put orange in bag for mother[.] leila has little new baby[.] new baby is bessie is eva sister[.] mildred is helen sister[.] helen is sick[.] doctor will give medicine to make well[.] helen does love george and anna[.] helen will kiss george and anna[.] good-by[,] helen keller[.]"

The letter is accompanied by a Cabinet Card Photo of Keller, by Collins of Huntsville, Alabama; as well as 20 additional 19th Century cabinet cards of other close Keller family members, including three images of Anna Turner, the recipient of this letter. In addition there are six more 19th Century photographs (all but one are cabinet cards) of more distant Keller family relations, all photographs identified on the backs in a later hand.

Keller's autobiography (*The Story of My Life*, 1903) contains a section on her letters. A short note to her cousin Anna is listed as her earliest letter (June 17, 1887) followed by a longer letter to her mother on July 12, 1887. The chronology then skips to September 1887 when Keller writes an encouraging letter to the blind girls at the Perkins Institution. An August 21, 1887 letter by Annie Sullivan mentions a "beautiful time in Huntsville" which would place the present letter sometime in mid-July — making it perhaps the third earliest known Keller letter. The handwriting and grammatical constructions, especially the use of "did" in past tense constructions and the omission of articles, is consistent with Keller's early letter-writing style.

One of the earliest known letters by Helen Keller, written just months after beginning her studies with Annie Sullivan, with additional family photographs. A remarkable artifact, and possibly the earliest Keller letter not held in an institution. [BTC#412705]









Contains 66 pages numbered in manuscript (of which seven are blank), a total of about 60 pages of pencil sketches, manuscript captions, newspaper clippings and mounted color lithographic emblems: drawn, written, and assembled by one Miss Ameilia Lochner, a young woman from Adrian, Michigan. In addition to documenting her observations on various social situations in sketches and accompanying clippings, the album includes contemporary

newspaper articles and two full-page pencil sketches by Lochner illustrating her violent confrontation with two burglars who broke into her bedroom one night and attempted to steal her purse and jewelry from a trunk at the foot of her bed.

The sketches and clippings document how she "courageously assaulted and drove a couple of burglars from her room at the residence of Mrs. Towne," likely a boarding house in Adrian, and also how she nearly died "six or seven years later" from a hemorrhage resulting from a blow she received to her stomach during the fight. Her account of the fight is particularly harrowing:


"... rousing from my sleep I saw a man standing by my bed, with a small lantern in his hand, while another very hard looking man was wrenching open my trunk ... As I rose up the man at my bedside pushed me back on the bed and whispered 'keep quiet and you shan't be hurt. Don't make a noise.' ... But I saw the fellow at the trunk taking my purse and jewelry, and I couldn't stand that ... I seized one of my shoes and threw it at the burglar ... The fellow then turned on me, and I grabbed a child's rocking horse and fought both men. I know I gave them some hard blows. The one at my trunk struck me in the stomach and on the head ... I clinched the trunk burglar by the collar, scratched him and tore off part of his collar. They forced me back against the wall and tried to smother me with their hands over my mouth'

When the commotion woke up children downstairs both men attempted to flee along with a third man at the window. Lochner then attacked one of the men who had gotten stuck in the window, and she yelled out to her neighbors for help: "... I screamed as loudly as possible, and thought I could manage to keep the burglars busy till the neighbors arrived to capture them. But not a neighbor came. I ran down stairs, grabbed a poker and went out to rouse the neighbors, but nobody would let me in, or come out"

The photograph album of Remedios F. Reyes, an aspiring nurse who attended Far Eastern University for high school and college, graduating as a registered nurse in 1965. The album shows the young "Remy" as a child, in grade school, as a member of the Far Eastern University Junior Cheering Squad, and going to prom. After high school she is seen in her nursing uniform posed with other students and friends. Two of the identification cards include pages noting the classes she was taking, one of which details the courses she received in nursing; a third card certifies Reyes's membership in the Girl Scouts of the Philippines. A program for her capping ceremony is also featured here. When out of uniform, Reyes and her fellow nurses wear fashions of the day and their hair in bouffants. It seems that by



the 1970s Reyes had moved to the United States. There is evidence of a Remedios Fajardo Reyes, born in 1943 in Manila and living in Chicago in 1970, when she applied to change her name to Jennifer Rey. Training nurses for export to the United States was a major part of the Philippines' economy.

An archive of snapshots from the 1964 Miss America pageant taken by a spectator at the event. They feature candids of the contestants with their sashes, in bathing suits walking on the beach, and posed in front of the official Miss American car with a caption on the verso identifying their state. Also shown are the floats used during the parade representing each state, including an elaborate float for Miss Kansas sponsored by the Kansas Wheat Commission. Nationally known sponsors such as Pepsi-Cola and Budweiser are represented in the images, as well as local businesses like South Jersey Gas and James Salt Water Taffy.

The 1964 pageant was held at the height of Miss America's popularity and marked a decade of the event being televised. According to historian Bill Gorman, "television viewership peaked during the early 1960s, when it was the highest-rated program on American television." That year's Miss Arkansas, Donna Axum, won and was the first from her state to do so. Axum went on to become a television personality as well as a professor at Texas Tech and a civic activist. In the 1990s she was nominated by President Bill Clinton to serve on the board of the National Committee for the Performing Arts of the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C.





She specialized in nature and animal photography and examples of this are seen throughout with western landscapes, birds flying and feeding, household pets of all kinds, and occasionally people in New York, but also California, Florida, and Chicago, interacting with their pets and wildlife. Many of the photos have Farrell's stamp and captions on the back, either handwritten directly on the photo or typed on a label; there are also a few scattered examples of the Ameri-Candid photo agency copyright stamp. One of Farrell's most famous photos is of a terrier

barking at a tree which was featured as the cover photograph for the April 5, 1937 issue of *LIFE* magazine. Two different size copies of the image are included here along with a copy of the magazine.

While Ferrell's focus was largely animals and landscapes, included are more than a dozen striking images of ordinary people that she saw during her travels. Among them are photos of workers baling hay and plowing fields, people at a town square (possibly in Mexico) buying and selling baked good and drinks, a young African-American man reading the newspaper while seated in a horse-drawn wagon, and a shot of young children sneaking a peek under a circus tent.




The archive of Nan Britton, the mistress of President Warren G. Harding, who gave birth to Harding's child out of wedlock and was vilified in the press for her 1927 tell-all book *The President's Daughter*. The book described their seven year affair in great detail and was finally confirmed to be true by DNA testing in 2015. The archive contains her personal and professional correspondence, several unpublished book manuscripts, Britton's unique first issue copy of *The President's Daughter* due to the printer's plates and printed sheets being seized and destroyed by the Society for the Suppression of Vice, and 100 original letters that she received from readers in response to her book describing their own personal experiences of having an illegitimate child, which she later incorporated into her second book, *Honesty or Politics*. The collection consists of about one linear foot of material housed by Britton in file folders and stationery boxes with her explanatory holograph and typed notes.


This collection documents Britton's life-long crusade to support her claim that Harding had fathered her daughter Elizabeth Ann shortly before his election as President in 1920, as well as for justice on behalf of all children born out of wedlock. Included are letters from a number of notable and


respected figures, such as Eleanor Roosevelt, Clarence Darrow, Alfred Kinsey, and Mary Roberts Rinehart, with several rebuffing her effort for help or failing to provide their opinion on illegitimate children out of hand, clearly indicating how much her reputation had suffered at the hands of public opinion.

Included among the unpublished typescripts are two complete variant versions of *Her Father's Daughter: The Life Story of Maria Malibran*, Britton's 600-page biography of the celebrated opera singer Malibran, perhaps the most famous woman of the 19th Century to have an illegitimate child; several chapters from Britton's unpublished autobiography, *Stony Limits*; two of Britton's unfinished historical surveys of bastardy: *A Thousand Years of Trial and Error* and *The Prehistoric Mother*; and the typescript of *Stories* by Britton's daughter Elizabeth Ann, consisting of about 40 of her original short works.

An historically important and compelling archive of papers belonging to Nan Britton, a victim of the press and social critics, whose life-long battle for recognition of her daughter was finally, if posthumously, validated. A detailed list is available upon request. [BTC#404301]



The collection begins with his business card which reads, "Hal Sands (Producer & Director) Stage shows for leading theatres...outdoor shows, state fairs, etc...night clubs and hotels... television...girl revues...(choreography by Dorothy Conova)." Many of the images show the troupe in various costumes, including space cadets and Native Americans, dancing and posing on stage. The Rockets are featured in parades, community events, waving to crowds, and showcasing "fabulous prizes." In a series of images Sands is posed with various sports figures and celebrities of the day including Carmen Miranda, Rosemary Clooney, Bob Hope, and Roy Rogers. One marquee advertising the group reads, "Spectacular Stage Extravaganza - Dozens of Girls - Singers! Dancers! - Hal Sands famed Manhattan Rockets - Gorgeous Girls in Sensational Numbers." The ephemera includes newspaper clippings, pamphlets, a large brochure from George A. Hamid's Aqua Circus (produced by Hal Sands), and two letters from fellow promoter Billy Erhardt of the Billy Erhardt Dance Company asking Sands if he's interested in his "girls" for the Rockets with a list of their height and noting "these girls are just out of high school." 



The novel was originally published in England in 1818 in three volumes. A remarkable achievement, combining gothic horror and romance, this book marked the creation of arguably the most famous monster in all of literature. The author was the daughter of author William Godwin and pioneer feminist writer Mary Wollstonecraft. She had no formal education, composing this tale at the age of 21 in Geneva as her contribution to a friendly competition between writers to create the best ghost story (no mean task as the other writers were her husband the poet Percy Shelley, his friend Lord Byron, and Byron's physician, J.W. Polidori, whose entry, *The* Vampyre, was the first vampire story in English). Needless to say, history has judged her the winner and her creation is probably the defining myth of the industrial and technological ages. A stage hit throughout the 19th Century, it has been filmed many times, most notably by James Whale with Boris Karloff as the creature. Shelley's creation has become a cultural icon, both high and low, and can be found everywhere from Halloween candy to dissertations on artificial intelligence. [BTC#424311]



Contemporary owner's name of Hiester H. Muhlenberg on the title page of Volume I; spine and labels a bit darkened, chips at the corners of the labels removing a few letters, small triangular chip on the spine, and slight erosion at the crown, light tidemark on front board, chip to rear fly, all in Volume II, but a handsome and nice very good or better copy in the fragile and uncommon boards.

A not uninteresting longer note in a contemporary hand (probably that of the aforementioned Muhlenberg) on a blank at the conclusion of Volume II states: "Strange and terrible tale. What an imagination must have been thine thou gifted child of genius and of song. My brain even now aches so intently have I been perusing thy fantasies. So terrible has been the interest they have excited. Farewell terrible book. I wish not to look at it again." Hiester Henry Muhlenberg was a doctor from Reading, Pennsylvania who graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in 1832 with his medical degree, the year before this edition was published. He later became a significant financier in Reading, Pennsylvania. Presumably Muhlenberg's familiarity with medicine and medical experimentation would have leant insights into his ruminations upon this work.



The group is largely comprised of 75 separate gelatin silver snapshots, most measuring approximately 2¾" x 3¾", and 12 images on five photo strips. Additionally there are 27 real photo postcards featuring the woman in the snapshots or others in her party. A few have small creases or small chips, but overall condition is near fine, none show signs of ever having been mounted. A fair number (a bit less than half) are captioned on the verso.

The overwhelming majority of the photos in this collection are focused on the events surrounding the 5th Winter Olympics with a scattered few from the towns of St. Moritz and nearby Davos. The games were held less than 18 months after World War II ended, and after a 12-year hiatus of the games due to political unrest and the War. Many of the photographs are action shots, including Alpine skiing and ski jumping (with some from the top of the ramp), another of the Norwegian team posing – including metal winners Petter Hugsted, Thorleif Schjelderup, and Birger Ruud (who at 36 attended the games as a coach but competed at the last minute,

winning a silver). Also notable are images of hockey matches, including the U.S. vs. the Austrians and the Czechs; figure skating, including at least two of Canadian Gold Medalist Barbara Ann Scott, one of Austrian Silver Medalist Eva Pawlik, and three of 18-year-old American Gold Medalist Dick Button "[J]ust after winning World Championship in men's figure skating" dressed in an overcoat fooling around. Two of the real photo postcards are of a woman in ski gear with two different numbers pinned to her, possibly indicating she was a participant, but we cannot confirm. We believe she was the owner of, and probably took some of the snapshot photos. One of the postcards has been filled out but not mailed by "Jean" to Penny Derryberry in Shreveport, Louisiana. Additionally there are four curved stamped medallions, possibly souvenirs or from ski poles, each with a Swiss or German reference.

A nice collection of images by a woman of the sparsely attended 1948 Olympics. [BTC#402869]




A broadside and photograph featuring "Miss Patricia McCormick ... the world's greatest lady bullfighter" and one of the "top Mexican matadors" in the 1950s. The photograph shows McCormick walking into the ring in her traje de luces surrounded by male matadors. Inscribed by McCormick "Dear George, Hope you enjoyed your first bull fight at Piedras Negras, Mexico — Pat 1954." Patricia McCormick is thought to be the first professional female matador. Originally from St. Louis, Missouri she

began fighting professionally in 1951. The broadside featured here is from a fight in Ciudad Acuña in June where later that year in September she was attacked by a bull and a priest was called to perform Last Rites. She recovered and continued to perform until 1962 but never advanced past the novice stage, novillera, as no male matador would mentor or sponsor her career. Her last fight was in San Antonio in 1962 before she retired to California where she became an artist and secretary.

A small but interesting archive from the short-lived career of the first female matador. [BTC#437694]











The print depicts Teddy Roosevelt and William Howard Taft in a serious tussle, while below them William Jennings Bryan is seen riding an ass, and around them are other symbolic figures (i.e. a farmer and a businessman shaking hands). Above the fray is a hand holding a balance over a globe showing the U.S. and above that is a watchful American eagle.

In the lower left-hand corner, attached by a small brass clip is an engraved card with the text: "Women's Convention, 142 5th Av. New York August 13-24" and an illustration showing a variety of women's hats being "thrown into the ring." The print is housed in a large original envelope from milliner Wurzberger & Hecht, who specialized in ladies' plumed hats, and whose address is identical to the address of the aforementioned "Women's Convention."

The owner Adolph Wurzburger's daughter, Julie Wurzburger Neumann, was at school at the time in order to earn a teaching degree, and in the 1914-15 edition of *Who's Who in American Women* (p.594) notes that she was "Actively engaged in religious, social and philanthropic work of the Brooklyn Soc. of Ethic'l Culture. Favors woman suffrage."

Printed by Stein, Paris's finest engraver, and illustrated by the fashion artist Auguste-Francois-Marie Gourget, who seems to have illustrated hats for the Paris fashion house of Jeanne Laurant, the logical conclusion is that Wurzburger and his suffrage-minded daughter commissioned the illustration to show support for Roosevelt and his Progressive Party and their pledge to support the right to vote for women. Or maybe they were just trying to sell hats. At any rate, interesting and evocative images of the struggle for woman suffrage. [BTC#426045]









According to Archives of Desire: The Queer Historical Work of New England Regionalism by J. Samaine Lockwood, "E.L.C." was Emma Lewis Coleman, a friend of Sarah Orne Jewett's and "...a member of a same sex-triadic domestic arrangement that included C. Alice Baker and Susan Minot Lane." The printed dedication in the book would bear that out: "To S.M.L., my life-long friend and companion; and E.L.C., to whose affection I owe my Summer in the Azores."

Lockwood in her book argues that the photographer Emma Lewis Coleman, and writers Sarah Orne Jewett, Alice Morse Earle, and C. Alice Baker, were part of an effort by New England women to re-write history as experienced by women, and their project was taken up by the women of a younger generation, such as Charlotte Perkins Gilman and Pauline Elizabeth Hopkins.





A young woman's photo album from Virginia circa 1910. The album records events in Catawba, Richmond, and Salem, Virginia and includes pictures from a trip to Kentucky, and several photographs from the young woman's friends living in

Shanghai. The young woman, named Julia, can be seen posing with friends and suitors. Many of the photographs show Julia with her college-aged friends traveling together in their automobiles and posing in photographs wearing the latest fashions, captioned "The Greatest Bunch on Earth." The photographs are well-shot and usually show the entire group smiling widely, even when Julia ends up in the Catawba Hospital for tuberculosis. Slipped inside is a small newspaper clipping talking about another young girl who recently died in the hospital due to surgical complications. In one photograph, Julia is seen being visited by her boyfriend with, "Forbidden ground" captioned below. Several photos show Julia in bed, but always smiling until a final photo shows her apparently cured and standing with the hospital workers whom she captions as the "Staff of Life." From this point on Julia can be seen with the other female patients and helping around the hospital. She takes pictures of a talent show put on by hospital staff for the patients with singing nurses, western theatrical plays, and three women during a performance in which one of the women is in blackface. Some of the photographs in the album feature double exposure and hand cut portrait photographs.



The women are seen fishing, camping, swimming, canoeing, and engaged in other outdoor sports and activities. It seems the women were close friends and tried to go on a trip once a year. They traveled around Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Canada, enjoying the natural landscape of the region including Elk Creek Lake, Chippewa River, various waterfalls, and the



Yellow River. They are often photographed goofing off and being silly. The women are pictured in fashionable clothes and stylish bobbed haircuts as well as trousers and bathing costumes. One photo is captioned, "waiting for President Coolidge" who was speaking at a church in Burke, Wisconsin in 1928. The camaraderie of the group is seen throughout the album with smiling faces, women draped over each other in cots, and working together to start camp fires and row boats. Towards the end of the album the women are seen skiing at a country club in 1933.



The injuries that a female factory worker could endure are illustrated at the bottom of the poster with a still from the film *Thumb's Up*, a 1943 movie starring Brenda Joyce as a night club singer turned munitions factory worker. Additionally included is a photo of an attractive woman in the "Krinky Kool Turban"

from the Hollywood Turban line. Turbans had been in fashion since the turn-of-the-century but gained popularity during World War II for their ability to help a factory worker look stylish while avoiding workplace injuries. They were also useful for style under the strict rationing of the mid-war years when anything from soap to water could be limited. Popularity continued through the 1960s with actresses such as Gloria Swanson, Carmen Miranda, and Lana Turner continuing the trend.
