Mitgang was a columnist and book critic for *The New York Times*. On January 25, 1981, Mitgang published a piece in *The New York Times* Book Review titled "Beckett in Paris"; the piece ends thusly: "As we walked outside, I suggested to Beckett that his photographs always made him appear too somber, and asked if he would allow me to take a few pictures. Relaxed, he stood in front of a street sign that read: 'SORTIE de SECOUR - ne pas encombrer' (Emergency Exit - do not block). Beckett weighed the words aloud. 'That's appropriate,' he said with a smile." A heavily cropped version of the portrait (showing only six letters of the sign) appears in the article, making this print all the more interesting. Volume 10 also includes the uncommon faux dust jacket that was released as part of a promotional packet with items meant to appear like they were created by the book's antagonist, Count Olaf.

The set includes: 1. *The Bad Beginning* (1999), 2. *The Reptile Room* (1999), 3. *The Wide Window* (2000), 4. *The Miserable Mill* (2000), 5. *The Austere Academy* (2000), 6. *The Ersatz Elevator* (2001), 7. *The Vile Village* (2001), 8. *The Hostile Hospital* (2001), 9. *The Carnivorous Carnival* (2002), 10. *The Slippery Slope* (2003), 11. *The Grim Grotto* (2004), 12. *The Penultimate Peril* (2005), and 13. *The End* (2006).

The books follow the three orphaned Baudelaire siblings who are forced to navigate an unkind world, while being manipulated and repeatedly endangered by their distant relative in an effort to steal their inheritance. The series was the basis for the 2004 film *A Series of Unfortunate Events* starring Jim Carrey, and the 2017 Netflix adaptation starring Neil Patrick Harris that ran for three seasons.

This is copy number 35. A sardonic take on the nativity story centered on a down-on-their-luck herbalist and costume designer couple looking for a place to stay for the night with their baby. While originally commissioned for *The Washington Post*, it was rejected upon submission, likely for fear of offending its readers. The manuscript remained unpublished until Johnson, a friend of Handler and Brown, needed a story to complete a book-binding class at The University of Iowa. This story has never been reprinted and remains the rarest of all of Lemony Snicket's books. [BTC#591400]

Appearing among the dramatis personae of the "Chorus of Greek Captive Maidens" is one E.W.L. Pound (Ezra Pound).

The program notes that the play was produced by the Department of Greek of the University of Pennsylvania and the music by Professor Hugh Archibald Clarke, also of the University. The translation is attributed to "[Isaac] Flagg's edition of the College Series of Greek Authors." Whether or not Pound tried to insert himself into the language of the play is only speculative. Lee T. Pearcy, *In the Shadow of Aristophanes: The 1903 Iphigeneia in Tauris in Philadelphia*, notes the participation of Pound in this production as a chorus member, and he also notes the teasing that Pound had to endure from his friend and fellow poet, medical student William Carlos Williams.

In any event, a very early appearance of Pound's name in printed form. His bibliographer, Donald Gallup, notes only one work by him that precedes this date, an anonymous poem heavily influenced by James Whitcomb Reilly that appeared in a 1902 Jenkintown, Pennsylvania newspaper, which was not (nor do we think definitively) attributed to him until 1972. While comparing Pound's earliest writing to just the appearance of his name in



print might justifiably be accused of comparing apples and oranges, it is undeniable that this is one of the earliest appearances of Pound's name in print. *OCLC* locates seven copies over two records. [BTC#589973]

Meachem won an Obie Award for her portrayal of Catherine in the debut of the 1958 off-Broadway production of the play. The book is additionally Inscribed by the play's director Herbert Machiz. Tennessee Williams worked alongside Seldes when she starred with Tallulah Bankhead in his ill-fated production of The Milk Train Doesn't Stop Here Anymore.

It represents, does it not, an erection of wood, stone and metal -" In the American edition "an erection" is changed to "a construction" ("Eighteen inches. Yes. Well. It represents, does it not, a construction of wood, stone and metal -"), apparently in case that Americans would come down with a case of the vapors from reading the word "erection." Even a cursory reading of the text reveals other words, sentences, punctuation, and usage that were changed for the American edition. Although the changes we discovered do not substantially change the meaning or pace of the novel, they do make for a modestly interesting insight into the process of the publication of this English novel into an American version.

Powell's rare first novel, a blatantly autobiographical novel about a small-town girl in her twenties from the Midwest aspiring to become a writer in New York, haunting Greenwich Village, drinking in speakeasies, finding romance and success, and finally

fitted up at the conclusion with an uncharacteristic and unbelievable happy ending. According to biographer Tim Page: "Powell disavowed the book almost immediately, well before her second novel *She Walks in Beauty* was promoted as her debut in 1928. Thereafter, she refused even to acknowledge *Whither* in her biography or in lists of her publications...she...was quite put out when her young friend Hannah Green found a copy in a secondhand bookstore in the early 1960s." Powell later went out of her way to purchase and destroy copies, which may be why this is only the second jacketed copy, and the only **Inscribed** copy, that we've seen.



Novelist Lisa Zeidner, in a review of the biography of Powell by Tim Page in *The New York Times Book Review*, said that "she is wittier than Dorothy Parker, dissects the rich better than F. Scott Fitzgerald, is more plaintive than Willa Cather in her evocation of the heartland and has a more supple control of satirical voice than Evelyn Waugh, the writer to whom




she's most often compared." We could find no other examples or references to this image of Salinger being used to promote his writing, but note that the original drawing appeared in an exhibition of his manuscripts and personal items at the New York Public Library in 2019, in celebration of his 100th birthday. Salinger famously demanded - that despite *Catcher* being his first book - the publisher not send review copies to critics, he not do press interviews (even after becoming a Book-of-the-Month Club selection), and his author photo be removed from the dust jacket. The incredulousness of his requests prompted the Little, Brown Vice President, D. Angus Cameron to intervene, asking the first-time author: "Do you want this book published or just printed?" Sensing the precariousness of the situation, Salinger fell in line, but for the last time.

We speculate that this drawing by Mitchell was created in the hope that it could be used by Little, Brown in place of an author photo, whether for *Catcher* or one of his next few books. Regardless, a compelling and rare image of Salinger created by his longtime friend and clearly illustrating his need for privacy. [BTC#568634]

2. Transmitted photograph. Image of an article about "Radio Vision" on the front page of the *The Sunday Star* of Washington, DC dated June 14, 1925. Not captioned. Approximately 43/4" x 6".

Charles Francis Jenkins (1867-1934) is recognized as the earliest major American television pioneer, broadcasting the first public display of his Radiovision on June 23, 1925. By then Jenkins was already a well-known inventor whose Phantascope film projector paved the way for Thomas Edison (who purchased the device and released it as his Vitascope). Jenkins first began imagining a mechanical method of sending "images over radio" (aka television) as early as the 1890s, according to Albert Abramson's *History of Television, 1880 to 1941*. Three years after his first public display of wireless transmission of synchronized sound and images, Jenkins formed the first television station in the United States in Wheaton, Maryland on July 2, 1928. The first broadcast of a moving image was a windmill. While his mechanical method was eventually eclipsed by an electronic form of television, he is still considered a television pioneer with an Academy of Television Arts & Sciences Award named in his honor.

The photos here were created by Jenkins during the early phase of his Radiovision. Using the prismatic ring approach to mechanical television, which he invented, it was reported that Jenkins transmitted the image of a woman by radio on June 14, 1923. Abramson says, "Whether 'live' or a photograph, this was the first transmission of television by radio ever reported" (p. 60).

The book itself is uncommon but accessible. However, early images such as these are seldom seen. There is one original held at the Library of Congress in the copyright collection, and seven others held in a private television museum. Rare and tangible artifacts from the birth of television. Wilde caused quite a stir in the States when he crossed the pond to give his 1882 lecture tour and this piece was created to cash in on his popularity. A great deal of the attention that Wilde garnered came from his appearance; The New York Times once commented, "He was dressed as probably no grown man in the world was ever dressed before." The front cover of this piece features a lovely example of Wilde's daring attire; the image was created from a photograph taken by Wilde's exclusive photographer (at least in America), Napoleon Sarony.
